He also enjoyed the attention of his former pupils. It was wonderful that so many people took the time to groom him and remind him of how special he was.

Something changed again last month. The excessive hair growth

now laminitis had

both of his front
feet. We are
thankful that the
pain was still at a
point where we
could manage it

with drugs and so his last afternoon was spent happily grazing on the lush grass between the paddocks.

On Thursday, October 30th, with the help of our vet, we were able to provide a dignified and peaceful farewell to a beautiful soul. We will really miss him.

The answer to October's Trivia Question is:


Q: This bone's name is derived from the latin for "PEA". We also have one in our wrist. What is this bone called?
